Thank God cause if it had not been for Brew there would never have been any maintenance or development of the website. This is especially true for Brew's design and management of the tour ticketing app. Web design is not a skill that was essential to 20<sup>th</sup> century correctional practice. Glen will continue with the newsletter and working on the history. Further, he and Bryan Hutchins will be developing historic presentations to be delivered to our tour guides and sweeps throughout the winter. We will be emailing all of you with the date, time, and location of the classes.

We still have a vacancy for the Treasurer on the Board. If you or someone you know is interested in assuming this role, please contact Glen Whorton so he can pass on the offer to the rest of the Board.

#### **PROJECTS:**

The major portion of the meeting was taken up with a review of our completed projects and our proposed activities. Maurice White and Lee Perks did the review and it was amazing the amount of work that has been accomplished to open this old structure. This is really a testament to the vigor of Maurice, Lee, Terry, Brew, Joe, Susan, and Jeff Lovelace.

The following are the identified projects for future action. Not listed is the roof repair that has surfaced as an immediate need, as evidenced by the last storm. Obviously, this is a huge list that encompasses every wish that we could conceive. A subcommittee of the Board will review this list in the near future for immediate action and financing.

### Priority 1 Projects (2022):

- 1. Admin building cleanup painting, light repairs
- 2. Yard drainage and grade leveling at south sidewalk
- 3. Kill/remove trees and debris at drainage trough at north side of lower yard
- 4. Parking lot entrance pavement and striping
- 5. A/C unit removal and Plexiglas installation
- 6. Admin building cleanup painting, light repairs
- 7. Repaint Visitor's Room walls, side rooms and sally port
- 8. Replace Visitor's Room vinyl baseboards (except those already painted)
- 9. Add screen over Sagebrush room exterior door
- 10. Admin front door mechanism and lower jams
- 11. Repair frozen/broken hinges on north wing doors to lower yard
- 12. Visitor room exit door to lower yard replace/repair
- 13. Replace and/or repair both Culinary Doors and jams

- 14. Lighting to control room
- 15. Re-lamp visiting room with LED lights and on/off switch
- 16. Visitor room ADA bathroom banks water/sewer improvements
- 17. Supply water to Warden's yard/trees
- 18. Flagpole area and brick sales area
- 19. Commission study of quarry face

#### **Priority 2 Projects (2022-2023):**

- 1. Maintenance road, interior and exterior north fence cleanup
- 2. Admin main entrance stair repair
- 3. Courthouse ramp replacement
- 4. Remove trees in quarry face above Cave
- 5. Remove tree stump at warm spring and repair damage to both walls
- 6. Remove tree stump at foundation near execution chamber
- 7. Restore Last Night Cell bars to original
- 8. Rehabilitate Selleck Guard Tower
- 9. Remove modern attachments and conduit at north wall
- 10. Remove cage at lower yard Tool Room / Shower
- 11. Repaint lower yard east metal exterior stairs near 7-Post
- 12. Repaint lower yard north metal exterior stairs
- 13. Landscape lower yard
- 14. Hot water to Courthouse
- 15. Repair and/or replace C-Block north doors and jams
- 16. Install faux door locks on C-Block Isolation Doors
- 17. Address issues from quarry face study

### Priority 3 Projects (2023-2024):

- 1. Repoint entire facility (possible apprenticeship project)
- 2. Execution chamber eastside metal stairs
- 3. Stairs to catwalk near courthouse
- 4. Cell House east side ADA ramp
- 5. Replace Sagebrush Door with proper Bar Door (in muster room)
- 6. Culinary stairs repair
- 7. Tunnel stairs repair
- 8. Replace weightlifting area concrete
- 9. Raise Sagebrush room transformer and switch gear above water level
- 10. Repair Courthouse outlets and electrical panel in closet
- 11. Re-electrify culinary lights and outlets
- 12. Re-electrify A, B, & C Block safety lights

- 13. Re-electrify laundry room
- 14. Re-electrify education outlets and lights and electric panel
